CODE OF CONDUCT

The success or failure of our fellowship depends on the conduct of each individual brother that attends. As an Arrowman, I understand and will observe all rules and regulations of the Order of the Arrow, the Boy Scouts of America, and will observe the reasonable demands made of me. As a member of the Order of the Arrow, I will:

1. Observe the Scout Law, Scout Oath, and the Obligation of the Order of the Arrow.
2. Wear my officially designated uniform as required throughout the fellowship, specifically during travel to and from the fellowship, during all shows, during Saturday evening supper, and during the chapel service/awards ceremony.
3. Attend the planned and general training sessions.
4. Confine the trading and swapping of Scout related items to free periods and in designated areas only.
5. Be personally responsible for the breakage, damage, or loss of property.
6. Observe quiet hours and lights-out hours.
7. Keep my quarters clean and dispose of trash in the proper places.
8. Not change my officially assigned area without permission.
9. Allow no unregistered person to occupy my quarters.
10. Shirts and shoes will be worn at all times in accordance with BSA policy.
11. No alcohol will be allowed on camp property.
12. Observe BSA tobacco use policy.
13. Respect the fellowship rules prohibiting the use of fireworks and firearms.
14. Not buy nor sell items at the fellowship other than at the Trading Post or as authorized by the Council of Chiefs. I understand that the Trading Post is the only official source for the purchase of items.
15. Not to leave camp without permission of the fellowship headquarters.
16. Remember that I am a guest of Bob White Lodge, of the Georgia-Carolina Council, and of the Knox Scout Reservation (KSR).
17. Park only in designated areas.
18. Abide by the BSA Guide to Safe Scouting.

I understand that the failure to abide by these rules, as approved by the Council of Chiefs, could result in my removal from the fellowship and camp premises.

TRAINING TOPICS

High Adventure & the OA, provided by Bob White Lodge
A session detailing the possibilities for lodge and chapter involvement in the BSA High Adventure programs and other exciting trips. This session will also focus on the three national OA High Adventure programs: Wilderness Voyage, Trail Crew, and Ocean Adventure.

Conducting Call-Outs, provided by Tomo Chi-Chi Lodge
This session focuses on the only public ceremony for Ordeal candidates. These ceremonies are crucial as they often present the first view of the OA to Boy Scouts and their parents. The session will focus on creative ideas for these ceremonies

Leave No Trace, provided by Skyuka Lodge
Leave No Trace is not simply a program for visiting the backcountry, it is an attitude and a way of life. This session explains the seven principles of Leave No Trace, and provides tips for use in your troop to practice proper outdoor ethics.

Understanding the Ordeal, provided by Eswau Huppeday Lodge
A session designed for all Ordeal members desiring to know more about the basic principles and symbolisms found within the Ordeal and Ordeal ceremony, and the steps they need to take towards Brotherhood.

The OA at Summer Camp, provided by Atta Kulla Kulla Lodge
What are some ways that your lodge can be involved in your council's summer camp program? This session will focus on incorporating the OA into summer camp program as well as getting Arrowmen on camp staff.

Cub Scouting and the OA, provided by Tsali Lodge
The lodge acts as an integral part of the council program. This session will focus on how you can work with another part of the council, Cub Scouts. It will teach you how to establish a great relationship with younger scouts in your area.

The 5-Year Plan: Long Term Lodge Planning, provided by Itibapishe Iti Hollo Lodge
People often ask the question, "Where do we go from here?" This session will show you how to answer that. It will discuss long term planning and "keeping your eye on the prize."

TRAINING TOPICS

Camping Promotion, provided by Unali'yi Lodge
Shows how lodges can more effectively promote camping, both weekend trips and summer camp, to help their troops and council.

Chapter Program, provided by Santee Lodge
Covers the basics of leading and building successful chapter program. Topics include conducting meetings; chapter officers, duties, and responsibilities; chapter events and service projects; and ideas that keep youth retained.

Elangomat Program, provided by Catawba Lodge
The Elangomat is one of the most crucial elements in the induction process including the Ordeal and leading up to Brotherhood conversion. The session should offer a brief overview on how an Elangomat act as a friend to the Ordeal candidate and how he should set the example for the candidate, including after the candidate has become a new member.

Duct Tape Workshop, provided by Muscogee Lodge
Everyone knows the Boy Scouts love Duct Tape. This session will focus on more of a metaphorical duct tape, putting all the scouting pieces together. Everything will come together for you.

Being Chiefly, provided by John Garwood, Section Trainer
ONLY DURING TRAINING SESSION ONE
So you want to be a lodge chief? Or maybe a section chief? First, you need to know the rules of the road. In this session, one of our top section trainers will discuss leadership skills and what it takes to "be chiefly."

Swindling the LEC, provided by Jay Widby, Section Trainer
ONLY DURING TRAINING SESSION TWO
Many Arrowmen are baffled by these all important meetings. They get bogged down by Robert's Rules of Order or lack understanding regarding how the chairmanship should work. This session will help guide you through the maze and get the most out of these meetings.

American Indian Events Training, provided by a Section Trainer
ONLY DURING TRAINING SESSION THREE
This session will teach more about Indian Affairs. It will focus on a specific area of this great part of the OA. Whether you're an Arrowman just getting interested in IA or more experienced, you should benefit from this session.

PARTICIPATION PIN REQUIREMENTS



In order for a delegate to receive a Participation Pin, you must fulfill attending three training sessions and having his Passport signed or stamped by the trainers. Brothers competing in, coaching, or judging American Indian Activities are not obliged to complete the training requirements for their Participation Pin. They may have their Passport signed by the competition judges. The Lodge Chief or Adviser should go to the Trading Post Saturday between 3-4 pm and pay \$1 each for the participation pins for registered delegates.
