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DMAT provides Dixie Health Service



DMAT, or the Disaster Medical Assistance Team, agreed to provide health services for the Dixie Fellowship 2006. DMAT, a unit from the Medical College of Georgia, provides emergency medical care at natural and man-made disaster areas. They agreed to administer the health center at Dixie as a means of training and practicing for any emergencies that might arise. They are required to undergo training before being deployed to a disaster site, so both centers enjoyed a dual benefit; the Bob White Lodge #87 received free expert medical care for all Dixie Participants, and the DMAT fulfills their training requirements.
